During the **Gloria in excelsis**, the Altar, the symbol of God's Presence, may be honoured with incense.

We praise Thee, we bless Thee, we worship Thee, we glorify Thee, we give thanks to Thee for Thy great glory, O Lord God, heavenly King, God the Father almighty. O Lord, the only-begotten Son, Jesus Christ: O Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father, that takest away the sins of the world, have mercy upon us. Thou that takest away the sins of the world, receive our prayer. Thou that sittest at the right hand of God the Father, have mercy upon us. For Thou only art holy, Thou only art the Lord; Thou only, O Christ, with the Holy Ghost, art most high, + in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

Merciful Lord, Who turned Augustine from his sins to be a faithful bishop and teacher: grant that we may follow him in penitence and discipline till our restless hearts find their rest in You: through Jesus Christ, Your Son our Lord, Who is alive and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, God, throughout all ages world without end. Amen.

A Reading from the first Letter of Saint John.

Beloved, let us love one another; for love is of God, and he who loves is born of God and knows God. He who does not love does not know God; for God is love. In this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent his only Son into the world, so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the expiation for our sins. Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another. No man has ever seen God; if we love one another, God abides in us and his love is perfected in us. By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his own Spirit. And we have seen and testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Saviour of the world. Whoever confesses that Jesus is the Son of God, God abides in him, and he in God. So we know and believe the love God has for us. God is love, and he who abides in love abides in God, and God abides in him.

This is the Word of the Lord.

How shall young people cleanse their way ◆ to keep themselves according to your word?

The Gospel book is carried to the Lectern:

Alleluia, alleluia! You have only one Father and He is in Heaven: you have only one teacher - the Christ. Alleluia!

Christ's Presence in the words of the Gospel may be honoured with incense.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew. Glory be to Thee, O Lord.

Jesus said to His disciples, "you are not to be called rabbi, for you have one teacher, and you are all brethren. And call no man your father on earth, for you have one Father, who is in heaven. Neither be called masters, for you have one master, the Christ. He who is greatest among you shall be your servant; whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and whoever humbles himself will be exalted.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise be to Thee, O Christ.

A homily may follow.

Let us pray for Wisdom to give voice to our prayers in the midst of this holy assembly:

Saint Augustine searched tirelessly for the Truth; and his writing has helped the Church in her continuing quest to know the God we serve. We ask God to inspire the Church in this land, the bishop, priests and people of this diocese, the monastic order, which bears Augustine's name; and all the leaders and theologians of the Church in our pilgrimage towards all Truth: Lord, in Your mercy ... hear our prayer.

Saint Augustine, through his writing, has influenced the course of world history. At this time we remember those caught up in the troubles and miseries of our world. We ask God to hold the peoples of earth in His love that migrants may be kept safe, tyrannies may fall, poverty and disadvantage fade and conflict be resolved: Lord, in Your mercy ... hear our prayer.

Saint Augustine's childhood was difficult in many ways as was his short-lived experience of fatherhood. We ask God to come to the help of all those who struggle in their own families: parents who feel overwhelmed by the challenges of childcare; and children whose parents are neglectful, abusive or inadequate. We pray for the work of the Children's Society, for the Family Lives organisation, foster parents, the Social Services and all who support those who cannot cope: Lord, in Your mercy ... hear our prayer.

Saint Augustine formed a number of close friendships, but others of his relationships were less than ideal. We ask God to strengthen all whose relationships cause them hurt or harm; and those who live under the dark clouds of loneliness and alienation: Lord, in Your mercy ... hear our prayer.

Saint Augustine suffered from chronic bouts of ill-health, both physical and mental. We ask God to comfort all who endure sickness, disease, injury, mental illness; we pray for people who care for others in hospital or at home; and those who have nobody to pray for them by name: Lord, in Your mercy ... hear our prayer.

Saint Augustine has taken his place in Heaven. We ask God to shine His Light of life eternal on all who have died. Among them we think this evening of the victims of conflict, natural calamity and war; and with them we remember Patricius, Augustine's father, Adeodatus, his son, and the unnamed concubine with whom Augustine shared some of his life: Lord, in Your mercy ... hear our prayer.

In union with our Lady, Saint Matthew, Saint Philip, Saint Augustine, Saint Monica and all the saints, we ask that God in His Wisdom will guard and keep His creation, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.

As the bread and wine are brought to the Altar and prepared for the Mass, the following is sung:

The righteous shall flourish like a palm tree; and spread abroad like a cedar in Libanus.

Here, while the Cherubim within the veil, adore the blest, life-giving Trinity, we in earth's worship echoing their part, hymn the thrice-holy in their company. So let all earthly cares be laid aside, that we may welcome Him Who draweth nigh, the King of Glory entering His courts, girt by the hidden armies of the sky. Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia!

The preparation of the Altar continues; incense may be used to honour the place where Christ will become present. At the end:

Thine, O Lord, is the greatness, the power and the glory and the victory and the majesty. All that is in Heaven and earth is Thine:
All things come of Thee, O Lord, and of Thine own do we give Thee.

God of Truth, receive all we offer this day. May we share in the Wisdom of Your eternal Word made known at this Eucharistic table. We ask this in the Name of Jesus Christ our Lord.

The priest begins the great prayer of thanksgiving:

The Lord be with you.

And with thy spirit.

Lift up your hearts;

We lift them up unto the Lord.

Let us give thanks unto our Lord God.

It is meet and right so to do.

It is indeed right and just, Our duty and our joy, Always and everywhere to give You thanks, Father most holy, almighty and eternal God, Through Your Son our Saviour. Today we celebrate the life of Augustine, The Bishop and Doctor of Your Church, Who counted all worldly gain as loss For the sake of knowing Christ his Lord. He taught of the Love which binds Your Being as Trinity; The Love poured into our hearts through the Spirit given to us, That we may hate what is evil and hold fast to what is good; The Love which makes us holy and draws us to Yourself, Joining us with angels and archangels Amd with all the company of Heave, To proclaim Your great and glorious Name, For ever praising You and saying:

Holy, holy, holy, Lord God of hosts. Heaven and earth are full of Thy glory. Glory be to Thee, O Lord most high.

+ Blessed is He that cometh in the Name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

We praise and bless you, loving Father, through Jesus Christ, our Lord; and as we obey his command, send your Holy Spirit, that broken bread and wine outpoured may be for us the body and blood of your dear Son.

On the night before he died he had supper with his Apostles and, taking bread, he praised you.

He broke the bread, gave it to them and said:

Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

The priest holds up the consecrated Host for the people to see.

When supper was ended he took the cup of wine.

Again he praised you, gave it to them and said:

Drink this, all of you;
this is my blood of the new covenant,
which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins.

Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

The priest holds up the chalice of consecrated wine for the people to see.

So, Father, we remember all that Jesus did, in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross.

Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.

Christ has died; Christ is risen; Christ will come again.

Lord of all life, help us to work together for that day when your kingdom comes and justice and mercy will be seen in all the earth. Look with favour on your people, gather us in your loving arms and bring us with [N and] all the saints to feast at your table in heaven.

Through Jesus Christ, our Lord, By Whom and with Whom and in Whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory are yours, O loving Father, for ever and ever.

Instructed by saving precepts and taught by divine example, we are bold to say:

Our Father,
Who art in Heaven,
hallowed by Thy Name;
Thy Kingdom come,
Thy Will be done on earth as it is in Heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread
and forgive us our trespasses
as we forgive those who trespass against us;
and lead us not into temptation,
but deliver us from evil.

The priest holds up the consecrated elements and invites people to receive Holy Communion:

+ Behold the Lamb of God; behold Him, Who takes away the sin of the world; happy are they who are called to His Supper.

Lord, I am not worthy to receive You; but only say the Word and my soul will be healed.

A faithful and careful servant whom the Lord has set over His household: to give them their food in due season.

Holy Communion follows.
